## Dear Parents and Carers,

Over the past two weeks, I have started each Bulletin message by focusing on the air of positivity that has pervaded the School during these first few weeks of term. Now that the children are back into routine proper and any honeymoon period has worn off, I was fully prepared for a dip in the levels of enthusiasm; I could not have been more mistaken! ## NOTICES

### Parking

I know Mr Morse wrote about this recently, however, the issue of parking is an ongoing issue and I hope that the following guidance will help in terms of traffic flow and, most importantly, keeping everyone safe.

### Mornings

Prior to 8.00 all Prep children must be dropped at the Treliske House front door and head to the dining room. After 8.00am Prep drop-off moves to the roundabout.

Prior to 8.15am, Pre-Prep children, must be dropped at the Treliske House front door where they will be escorted to the dining room. After 8.15am, parents should pull into one of the bays adjacent to the flagpole whereupon the children can make their way into the Pre-Prep.

Please note that there is no provision for parking on the drive and this includes parents of Pre-Prep pupils. Pre-Prep parents, guardians and carers should queue on the right-hand side and drop off by pulling into one of the bays adjacent to the flagpole. This week we had cars stuck in what they thought was the queue to drop-off for Pre-Prep, when in fact some vehicles had been parked. This inevitably impacted on others queuing for Pre-Prep and Prep drop-off and created congestion all-round.

The left-hand side of the drive must remain clear for cars to travel through the site to the roundabout and the exit drive.

### Afternoons

Please note that there is no provision for parking on the drive. Please queue on the right-hand side of the drive until the wooden gates are opened (3.10pm). It is imperative that the lefthand side of the drive remains clear for emergency service access and vehicles exiting the school.

The rope barriers remain in place at the zebra crossing until 3.20pm, as activities are still taking place on the roundabout. Please park in the staff carpark (afternoons only), the visitor spaces, the bays by the flagpole at the roundabout and adjacent to the playground. We will do our utmost to direct you and to help keep traffic moving but your patience is much appreciated.

Finally, with the children's lungs and the environment in mind, please turn your engines off whilst waiting.

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## Year 4 Explore the Roseland

Year 4 had a wonderful ramble in the sunshine of the Roseland. Their adventure began at a slightly overcast Portscatho where our Year 4 hikers enjoyed the peace and tranquillity of the woods. After what seemed like a long ascent, weary legs enjoyed a short rest as they breathed in the fresh air and delighted in the stunning views.

Soon enough, they were on the move again, heading for the glorious yellow hues of Place House and its immaculately lawned gardens. Home to the Spry family for over 400 hundred years, it was hard to imagine this grand building was ever in such disrepair after the war.

It is rumoured that King Henry VIII and his new bride Anne Boleyn once stayed at Place House. There are certainly reminders of their visit to St Anthony-in-the Roseland church, carefully tucked behind the house. Beside a small side door, which would have once led into the monastery and still connects the church to the manor house, is an old wooden pew. The front of this seat is decorated with the arms of Anne Boleyn and Henry VIII. Here the children had a few moments of contemplation and some took to the pulpit to address their imaginary congregation.

The final stint of the walk took our pupils to what seemed like the top of the world. The sun emerged from behind the clouds, lighting up the panoramic views of St Mawes and Pendennis Castles nodding to each other over the water. Carefully walking the coastal path, cooled by the gentle breeze, pupils learned how the headland was used to defend Falmouth against coastal attacks.

Finally, our Year 4's arrived at their destination, St Anthony's Lighthouse. Built in 1835, it has what is thought to contain the largest fog bell in Cornwall. Keeping the ships safe as they travelled along the Carrick Roads, one of the largest natural harbours in the world, the iconic white building is perhaps best known as 'The Fraggie Rock Lighthouse'.

Our staff and pupils had a memorable and enjoyable day exploring our beautiful Cornish landscape and learning about the rich history of the place we are lucky enough to call home.

From our outstanding, co-educational teacher-led Nursery provision to the end of Year 2, our Pre-Prep teaching gives our pupils a fantastic platform for learning and development, ensuring a flying start for all.



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## Exploring Our Early Years Provision

At Truro School Pre-Prep, we are proud to offer teacher-led provision for even our youngest pupils. Our co-educational Nursery, catering from age three, offers quality-first teaching led by Miss Jasmine Sampson, a qualified Early Years teacher and our Nursery Lead.

Being teacher-led helps to create a structured early learning programme, that carefully balances continuous provision (play-based learning) with phonics, maths and early writing.

Our provision benefits from daily access to our extensive Enchanted Garden and also includes swimming in our on-site pool, languages, forest school and music sessions, all taught by specialists.

## Going Bananas for Harvest

Assemblies took a turn for the bananas at Truro School Prep and Pre-Prep today as our pupils gathered to celebrate Harvest. Led by Rev Banana (aka our Chaplain, Rev Helen), the Prep assembly opened with a call to worship from Jenson and Ezra. They encouraged our pupils to celebrate Harvest as a time to be grateful, to thank those who work hard and to remember those who don't have enough to eat.

The assemblies were themed around 'Going Bananas for Harvest'; an initiative led by the Fair Trade Association to encourage people to consider whether those who work so hard to grow our food and raw materials are paid a fair wage. With 5 billion bananas eaten in the UK each year, Rev Helen used this fruit to show how profits can be unfairly distributed between other points in the distribution chain, with farmers often being paid the tiniest share of the profit. 'Appeeling' for change, Rev Helen encouraged children to look for Fairtrade stickers on our food items to ensure farmers worldwide are paid a guaranteed minimum wage.

After some rousing Harvest hymns, the assemblies finished with a closing prayer, encouraging our pupils to be thankful for our blessings and to show kindness in supporting those who don't have enough to eat.

Thanks to Rev Helen and to our pupils and families who have been bringing in donations for the Truro Foodbank across the week as a part of the Harvest celebrations.



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## Year 6 Dive In

It was the turn of our Year 6 Truro School Prep pupils to visit the Sir Ben Ainslie (SBA) swimming pool at the Senior School this week for their swimming time trials.

Designed to check where current pupils are and to assess any new starters, these sessions are a gentle start to competitive swimming events. For many pupils, it is the first time they have swum in a 25m pool or competed under race conditions.

It was fantastic to see pupils enjoying the facilities at the SBA and show great courage and camaraderie as the afternoon progressed. Well done to all of our Year 6 pupils and thanks to the staff who make swimming such an integral part of our Truro School curriculum from Nursery through to the Senior School.



## Computing Safari at Prep

This week, our Year 3 pupils took part in a Network Safari in computing, diving into the fascinating world of technology that keeps our school connected.

### Navigating Self Esteem

As we navigate the exciting journey of childhood development together, one of the most valuable gifts we can give our children is confidence. ### Our Learning This Week:

This week the Nursery started 'Dough Disco', an initiative that allows us to practise our fine motor skills. They also spent time in the orchard and tasted some of the apples that grow there. Back in the classroom the children have worked on their writing skills.

The Reception children have had to deal with an escaped crocodile! He travelled from our storybook into the classroom and has been eating up all of the letters 'o' and 's' from our class displays. Our pupils have been tracking the crafty croc's footprints, drawing maps to find him and then writing new letters to replace the eaten ones. Our Read, Write Inc phonics sessions have also started this week.

Year 1 have been busy completing literacy challenges to earn 'challenge stickers'. The pupils have worked on vowels and consonants and have welcomed an 'Angry Elephant In Orange Underpants' into class! In maths lessons, the children have practised counting forwards and backwards and grouping objects in different ways, whilst in Science, they have tested the strength of different materials.

Year 2 have studied the Romans, while RWI lessons have begun in phonics. The Year 2 children visited the library at the Prep School for the first time and have also become published poets; they all contributed to an acrostic poem that has been published in "Monster Acrostics", published by Young Writers.
