### Dear Parents and Carers,

With term flying by at a frenetic pace, we took some time at the beginning of this week to reflect on the start of September in terms of the targets we had set for ourselves and the importance of 'Attitude'.

This naturally provided a prompt for some but the overwhelming message was that the children felt that they had started the term well and were making good progress. That said, with four weeks under our belts, a little tiredness is creeping in and with it, the odd occasion where we are perhaps less considerate or focused than one would hope. The focus of this

week's message was, therefore, on the words that I happened upon whilst listening to Radio 4's Prayer for the Day: 'Let us do nothing today that we will regret in the future'.

We explored how following this guidance might affect us in the classroom, in our games and activities programme or when interacting with our friends. The main thrust however was to examine this from a positive perspective, namely, 'let us do things today that will make us proud in the future'.

#### News from the School Community:

In looking at Truro School, not just the Pre-Prep and Prep but the entire Truro School community, there is so much to take pride in. I know that you are well versed in happenings here at Treliske House courtesy of the weekly Bulletins but I thought it would be interesting for you to hear a little more news from the Senior School.

- This year's A-level results were the best top-grade outcome for Truro School for a decade with over 73% of all grades at A\*-B and over 45% at A\*/A. Using the national A-level Performance System (ALPS), this places Truro School's value-added scores in the top 10% of schools across the nation.
- GCSE scores were also up on last year with over 52% of grades between 9 and 7 and over one-third of all grades were 9 or 8 the very highest outcomes.
- Furthermore, over 100 clubs are offered as part of the extracurricular programme and recent trips include Borneo, Iceland, Munich, and Italy.

With the whole School receiving a recent award from Talk Education for Creative and Performing Arts, and both Prep and Senior Schools being currently shortlisted for honours at the Independent Schools Award, there is clearly much to celebrate. To continue in this vein, and in response to feedback from parents, we will be hosting 'An introduction to the Senior School' event for Prep School parents, here at Truro School Prep on the 19th of November. #### Attendance News:

The aforementioned achievements are, of course, a direct result of children, staff and parents working closely together but are only possible if children are attending school on a regular basis.

On this note you might be interested to read the following comments and statistics on school attendance from the DFE: 'The Department for Education (DfE) expects every pupil attending school to maintain an attendance level of approximately 90% and above; any figure below this is deemed "poor attendance".

There is clear evidence from national data of a link between poor attendance at school and low levels of achievement. Of pupils who miss less than 5% of school nationally, 73% achieve five A\* to Cs (9-4s), including English and maths. Department for Education guidance states that where absence escalates and pupils miss 10% or more of school (approximately 17 days in an academic year), schools are expected to sensitively consider the reasons for absence and put additional targeted support in place.

Of course, Truro School expects pupils to outperform national outcomes in academic terms and views regular attendance as one contributing factor to that ambition for our pupils. As such, we will endeavour to contact parents, guardians and carers of pupils should attendance fall below 92% so that the reasons for frequent absence can be better understood and, most importantly so that we can offer help and support to parents, guardians, carers and children.

#### Conkers Return:

Finally, I am to inform you that next week sees the return of the Truro School Prep Conker Competition (Mr Keveren will arrange a similar opportunity in the Pre-Prep). Further details will follow next week but there is much excitement and speculation as to whether our current champion, Charlie, will retain his crown. Autumn has most definitely arrived!

### **News & Information for Parents**

### **Sepsis Awareness**

Sepsis is a serious medical condition that can affect anyone, it's dangerous for children and adults. It happens when the body overreacts to an infection, causing damage to its own tissues and organs. While it can start from something as simple as a small cut or a common infection, sepsis can quickly become life-threatening if not treated in time.

For parents and carers, knowing the signs of sepsis in children can be life-saving. Early detection is key to getting the right treatment fast. Symptoms can be difficult to spot, but here are some important ones to look out for:

### ANY CHILD WHO:

- Is breathing very fast
- 2 Has a 'fit' or convulsion
- Looks mottled, bluish, or pale
- 4 Has a rash that does not fade when you press it
- Is very lethargic or difficult to wake
- 6 Feels abnormally cold to touch

### **MIGHT HAVE SEPSIS**

Call 999 and ask: could it be sepsis?

### ANY CHILD UNDER 5 WHO:

- Is not feeding
- 2 Is vomiting repeatedly
- 3 Hasn't had a wee or wet nappy for 12 hours

### MIGHT HAVE SEPSIS

If you're worried they're deteriorating call 111 or see your GP



If a child seems to be getting worse instead of better after an illness, it's always best to seek medical advice. Trust your instincts; if something doesn't seem right, act quickly. Raising awareness of sepsis can save lives by helping families spot the early warning signs and get children the help they need.

### Pre-Prep Achievements





In Nursery this week, The children have started our new 'hedgehog' topic by spending time outside to sort leaves by size and shape. We have also been making playdough hedgehogs.

The Reception children have used a microscope to examine reptile skin before drawing what we could see and describing it with adjectives. In art, the children made two giant geckos out of recycled bottle tops for our classroom display. We also had an exciting 'forest school in a storm' and got to use the storm shelters!

The Year 1 children have learnt how and when to use full stops and exclamation marks in our writing. In science lessons, they have tested how absorbent and waterproof different materials are. In maths, pupils have spent time ordering numbers up to 20 and have learnt how to move up and down a number line.

Year 2 have continued their study of the Romans and created fact files. The children have written a 'wanted' poster for Boudica and finished their preparation for their Roman Day. In Maths lessons, they have continued their work on understanding number and identifying the properties of shapes.
