Dear Parents and Carers,

As we reach the end of the first half of the autumn term, I took the opportunity to challenge the children to reflect on an incredible six weeks here at Truro School Prep. It would have been all too easy to focus on the excellence in the classroom, the breadth of extracurricular offerings and the nominations and awards. Our reflection, however, was directed upon the targets that we had set for ourselves as individuals and to recognise the progress we have made. Once we had 'looked back' we turned our sights to the future, identifying our priorities for the second half of this term.

As one would expect, our attention also fell upon the forthcoming half term holiday and I was delighted to learn of the many and varied holidays that lie ahead. Equally exciting,

was the range of activities that the children were looking forward to; going to the beach, walking, surfing, swimming, building dens/camps/treehouses, birthday parties, reading and playing games all featured high on the list.

Given that so many of these activities take place in the great outdoors, it was an ideal opportunity for me to return to a previous message and to underline the importance of appreciating our natural environment (whether at home or abroad). A further activity that was much anticipated by many was the opportunity to play online games and to have time 'online'. In response, I was able to pass on some information from a conversation that I had with a representative of CEOPS (the Child Exploitation Online Protection Service) who was very keen to remind me (as well as children and parents) that the overwhelming majority of social media sites have a minimum age guidance of 13 years old. Furthermore, she was keen to point out that games also have a minimum age guidance and that we ignore such guidance at our peril. During the assembly, we also looked at the importance of reading and being aware of user agreements, and how companies and social media platforms change such arrangements regularly.

Taking a step back from the children, I am mindful that many families and parents approach their children's use of the Internet and smartphones, in a variety of different ways. I am also aware that it is all too easy for children (and us as parents) to become fixated on screens - the platforms and games that we engage with are specifically designed to grasp and maintain our attention.

As such, I was pleased to have the opportunity to share with the Prep School children and staff, one of my favourite short videos: Look Up by Gary Turk. This was first released some 10 years ago and is a poem which explores how smartphones and social media have impacted and may, in the future, impact our lives. For the children's assembly, I used the edited version (thus avoiding any inappropriate language), which you can view here: Look Up edited (youtube.com).

Wherever you are over the half term break, I wish you all a very happy holiday with your lovely children. I hope that you have the opportunity to 'look up' and appreciate everything that this amazing world has to offer.

Floyd Steadman Inspires at Prep

Our lucky Year 5 and 6 pupils were treated to an inspirational talk from Deputy Lieutenant of Cornwall, Floyd Steadman OBE as a part of Black History Month.

Mr Steadman, who was also a Captain for Saracens Rugby Club, inspired thoughts on unconscious bias and racism. Talking of his own experiences of prejudice, Mr Steadman challenged pupils in Years 5 and 6 to "Look beyond what you see and hear and get to know people" before making judgements.

Mr Steadman has been Head Teacher of four London Prep Schools in addition to an illustrious sporting career that saw him named as the first black captain of a major rugby club aged just 23. In 2023, he was awarded an OBE and is awaiting a doctorate. His inspiring words told of his journey through hardship, spurred on by the belief that hard work and determination would change his life.

Mr Steadman hopes that his words will inspire the next generation to be kinder and make the world a better place through tolerance and acceptance. He left our pupils with challenges to:

Overcome challenges
Believe in yourself
Reach for the stars
Be positive
Act with kindness and compassion
And to remember that making good choices leads to success.

Our pupils were so enthralled by his story, that there were too many questions for him to answer and there was a queue to catch him after the assembly. We would like to express our gratitude to Mr Steadman for his time and inspiring and thought-provoking talk.

More From a Monday at Prep

On Monday afternoons at Truro School Prep, our Year 3 and 4 pupils take part in a programme of extra-curricular activities, with activities this term rotating across chess, kayaking, cycling, dance, bushcraft and cookery. These sessions allow the pupils to learn new skills, enhance or develop new hobbies and interests and develop skills like teamwork and resilience.

Language and Nature Inspire the Bigger Picture







Rita Mae Brown, the American Writer famously said, "Language is the road map of a culture". This quote has inspired this half term's Bigger Picture homework for our Year 6 pupils, who have been challenged to delve deeper into language and its relevancy in our lives, past, present and future.

For this topic, our pupils have considered questions including where does language come from (and where does it go)? How much of our language has been 'borrowed' from other countries and what influences changes in language? What can we learn about another culture from its language and is there an 'easy' language to learn?

Meanwhile, our Year 5 pupils have been challenged to consider nature in terms of how it has inspired and influenced us within our lives and the wider world.

Designed to challenge our oldest pupils, the Bigger Picture homework is set half-termly and provides pupils with an open-ended question for them to explore and feedback on; in any creative way they see fit.

As the work was displayed in the Assembly Hall this week and our Prep children gathered to view the submissions, it was truly inspiring to see the creativity and conversation that has flourished from our pupil cohort as they have responded to this task. Throughout the term, it was similarly remarkable to see the confidence and courage displayed as they shared their projects and presentations with their peers and teachers.

A huge well done to all of our amazing Bigger Picture Thinkers and thanks to Mr Dove for leading the initiative. We look forward to sharing more updates from future work.

Reading Records:

We are trialling a different system for recording pupils' reading this year, in the hope that there will be fewer lost reading records and therefore greater accuracy and consistency when recording books read. All pupils have reading record sheets in the back of their English books and are given the opportunity to update these at the start of every lesson. Their English teachers will monitor this and award reading certificates accordingly.

Previously, when we have heard your child read, a note has been written in their reading record. This is now in their planner, but please look out for notes home about fabulous reading in school.

We all know the importance and benefits of reading and recent studies have found that children who read for pleasure have higher levels of empathy, greater self-esteem and are better able to cope with difficult situations. However, it can sometimes be difficult to find just the right book for your child or in fact tips to support reading at home. 





Maths Updates:

You may have seen posters in the Bulletin regarding several maths initiatives that have been running.

The Battle of the Bands has been running this week as an inter-tutor group competition for Y5/6 to encourage more time engaging with Times Tables Rockstars (TTRS).

The "England Rocks" competition on TTRS runs from the 12th-14th November and is a fun, nationwide event where students across England compete to improve their multiplication skills. This competition runs between the hours of 7.30am and 7.30pm each day with a daily cap of 1 hour per player. Schools are ranked based on the total number of correct answers, with prizes and recognition awarded to top-performing schools and students.

At Truro School Prep, we have an expectation of 5 minutes of TTRS per day as a part of the home-learning programme. The aim of these additional competitions is to motivate children to practice their times tables in a fun and engaging way, while fostering a sense of achievement and healthy competition.

The Primary Maths Challenge (PMC) is a national competition designed to challenge and inspire primary school students in mathematics. Aimed at pupils in Years 5 and 6, the PMC tests problem-solving skills through a variety of fun and engaging questions that go beyond the typical classroom curriculum.

The challenge is held annually, with top scorers being invited to participate in a follow-up bonus round. The aim is to develop students' mathematical thinking and confidence, while celebrating their achievements in a supportive and encouraging environment. We are running the challenge on the 12th November within students' normal maths lessons. Students who engage with extra-curricular maths activities (such as Maths Masters Club) in Y4 will also be invited to take part.

Notes from the Wild Wood continued

As the season of hibernation and bonfires approaches, wildlife, in particular hedgehogs need our help. These are the things you can do...

- 1) Leave a part of your garden wild to encourage greater biodiversity and a greater variety of food for hedgehogs. Remember not to use pesticides (including pet flea treatments).
- 2) Create Hedgehog Highways in garden fences (13cm x 13 cm) to allow animals to forage more easily and join the Hedgehog Street Network. Visit: Hedgehogs People's Trust for Endangered Species (ptes.org) at https://ptes.org/campaigns/hedgehogs/)
- 3) Light your bonfire carefully remember to make a new bonfire pile on the day of lighting to avoid killing any animals that have made this pile their home. https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-check-your-bonfire-hedgehogs
- 4) Have you seen a hedgehog in the day? It is likely they are hungry. You can provide cat food and seek advice from The British Hedgehog Preservation Society (<u>britishhedgehogs.org.uk</u>).
- 5) Build a hedgehog house. Try to recycle off-cuts of timber or use an old storage box. Find out more at https://www.wildaboutgardens.org.uk/sites/default/files/2021-05/16597%20WAG%20-%20Hedgehog%2016pp%20Booklet%20AW_0.pdf





Pre-Prep Achievements





In Nursery this week, the children had a super time at Healey's Cyder Farm. We saw the process apples go through from field to bottle, and we created labels for our apple juice bottles. Later in the week, the children met their reading buddies and enjoyed stories together.

The Reception children have been coming up with adjectives to describe the features of a tortoise and alligator. This was followed by some observational drawing from two preserved specimens. In maths, the children explored 'weight' and had a go at measuring different objects with scales.

In Year 1's literacy, the children finished writing their own versions of The Tempest. In science, they tested different materials for buoyancy, and thought carefully about which material would be good to use for a boat. They then painted pictures of Tudor castles in preparation for our school trip to Pendennis.

In Year 2, our budding authors have been creating stories inspired by the Tinga Tale 'Why Monkeys Swing in Trees'. In maths, we have been exploring symmetry and discovered that circles have infinite lines of symmetry. If you listen carefully, you might hear the sounds of Christmas as our festive production rehearsals have got underway.
